DEAR FRIENDS

*This a précis of some of the Vicar's comments
at the recent Annual Parochial Church Meetings.*

My first full year as Vicar of the United Benefice of Walmersley Road has been a very enjoyable one with many twists and turns amidst the challenges in parish ministry of maintaining a Christian presence in the community.

I wish to reiterate the comments made at my first Sunday service in July 2013.

There remains NO AGENDA TO MERGE THE TWO PARISHES
NO PLANS TO CLOSE A CHURCH.

I firmly believe that one of the major strengths of the Church of England is the parish system which seeks to root ministry, worship and fellowship in a local context. As long as I am here I will seek to maintain the presence of two places of worship here in our benefice and maybe more.

As always I would like to thank you for your support which is very much appreciated. Later this year will see the arrival of a new Curate – please make her welcome in the same way Linda and I felt welcome two years ago. My thanks also to everyone who helps in any way, shape or form to keep the churches functioning and supporting me and the mission of the church.

One of the tasks that parishes have been asked by the Diocese to fulfil in the next few months is that of creating a Mission Action Plan. MAPs are designed to think about mission opportunities in the parish and putting them into practice. Both parishes have been thinking of this in recent months and we hope to be in a position to publish our MAPs very soon.

Central to our Mission Action Planning are three suppositions that should run through every part of our life as a Christian community.

The eternal message of the GOSPEL and our calling to teach and proclaim it at all times.

The pastoral nature of our MINISTRY which means that relationship is at the heart of all we do.

The need to engage in MISSION which is the main reason (together with worship) that the Christian Church exists.

I invite you to join with me and my fellow ministers to put these Mission Plans into Action - as by God's grace we aim to grow God's Kingdom here in our part of Bury.

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF APRIL

The Architect has visited again to consider the proposals for the West Window. It would appear that we may be able to go ahead with just blocking up the bottom row of panes. He has taken photographs and the matter will be referred back to the DAC at their next meeting in May. There is still some way to go with this issue and the possibility of planning permission from the council may even have to be sought.

An engineer has looked at the Chapel heating and has advised that we will require further advice as the heater is commercial (industrial) and therefore he cannot touch this himself.

A volunteer has agreed to take on the running of the Website and possible volunteers have agreed to be the Child Protection Co-Ordinator and also a school governor at our day school.

Rosemarie again appealed for a group of people to organise the Firework party in November. As previously reported this event has been cancelled at the last minute for 2 years running, and we aim to stop this happening again.

A new lock and security system has been installed on the inner hall door. The PCC received instructions on how to use this.

At our PCC away day in January, it was suggested that a questionnaire be given to all members of our Electoral Roll to discover what they would like from their Church. A discussion followed. as to what questions could be included The Vicar also outlined our mission action plan (MAP) and advised that the 5 topics of our plan would form the basis of our discussions over the coming months.

We have been invited to send a PCC member to attend a presentation in June of the work of Church Housing.

The Treasurer informed us that he is attending a meeting in May regarding changes to how the Parish Share is calculated.

Pray with us

- **Protection** for the one million or more that are now at risk of disease from lack of fresh water and shelter.

The Mothers' Union President in North India, Neerja Prasad, writes that Bihar, where the Mothers' Union was due to hold its Synodical level programme next month, has been affected as well as the communities in the Indian dioceses of Chotanagpur and Patna. Nepal, she writes, has been "devastated".

As Mothers' Union have no staff or members in Nepal, we are not at this time requesting Relief Funding. However should India's Mothers' Union be in a position to respond and reach people affected both in India and close to the border, we will immediately let our supporters know.

Burundi

Currently, there are reports of police using live ammunition to disperse protesters in Burundi after President Pierre Nkurunziza launched a bid for a third term in office. At present, two protesters have been killed and there is great unrest and fear that the hard won peace deal of 2005 which ended 12 years of civil war, is under threat.

People are fleeing the conflict area in Bujumbura and our President, Mathilde writes that powerful prayers are needed. She has already taken in seven children evacuated from the Rainbow Centre where the foster families are living in the danger zones, with other members doing likewise. Please pray for a return to peace for Bujumbura and Burundi.

It was a double celebration – Arthur Smith celebrated his one hundredth birthday and eighty years as organist at Christ Church.

He has hung up his “organ playing” shoes after playing thousands of hymns, chivvyng hundreds of choristers and enriching untold weddings. In addition he has accompanied gang shows, pantomimes, participated in several “Last Night of the Proms” and played throughout many Flower Festivals.

At the service on May 10th Arthur chose the hymns and a large congregation gave him a standing ovation when he emerged from the organ loft. In typical Arthur fashion he recalled instances of happy times with the choir and thanked everyone for their support over his time as organist.

After the service a lunch was held in the church hall – when in true Walmersley fashion there was enough food to feed 5000. The Bishop of Bolton attended and thanked Arthur for his dedication, commitment, example and service, commenting that he had outlasted more than 30 prime ministers and four monarchs.

Arthur received many cards including one from the Bishop of Manchester and one from Bury Football Club signed by all the team.

Arthur was presented with a photo book depicting his time as organist.

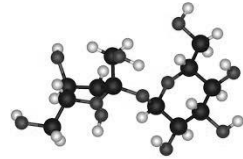

THE OPEN GROUP

On 13th May, the Open Group welcomed fellow member David Andrew to present his illustrated talk 'Atoms & Aunts'. A rather curious subject to which members were given an interesting insight - into the creation of atoms and their importance in our very existence and everyday lives from both a scientific and religious viewpoint.

As an introduction and background to his talk, David explained that prior to the 20th Century scientists generally believed that our universe never had a beginning and that biblical accounts of creation from 'nothing to everything' were unscientific and not possible. However the dawn of the 20th Century saw the greatest scientific minds progressively having cause, through experimentations, to rethink the origin of our universe in discovering such elements of matter, energy, space and time itself had a beginning. That a parallel existed between the beginnings of the World (The Big Bang) as an event, and the Christian notion of 'Creation from Nothing' being an act of God.



So with this in mind, we turn to David's topic of atoms and their place in the World. David asked searching questions – Who created the atom? Was it in fact the result of the 'Big Bang' or that of a creator? How do people know that atoms exist as no one has really seen an atom? After all humans like to see something before they believe it.

David explained the purpose and content of atoms by illustrated diagrams. Interestingly, members questioned how it was possible for a chance cosmic explosion (Big Bang) to create such a complex and precise element such as an atom? Unless of course it was precisely engineered by a designer?; Hence a creator? Food for thought!

Members remembered their past schooldays in Chemistry class and were able to identify important elements of the atom, such as protons, neutrons and electrons and their particular purposes and uses in everyday life.

In conclusion, David was thanked for his input which gave members a lot to think about. It left a message that for all its wonderful innovations and creations, Science so far has not been able to answer fully questions about God and the purpose of life. For Christians however, and as David commented throughout, the Bible's message about 'Creation from Nothing' is indeed trustworthy regarding God, life and purpose. In essence might we ask has Science begun to discover God? Our learning of the atom this evening might suggest so.

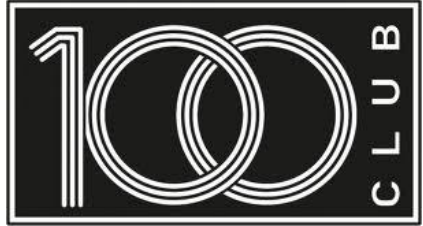

'Little Voice' Stamps

VOLUNTEERING ON THE INCREASE

A recent survey has shown that the number of people working in community projects through their church has risen by almost 60% in the past four years. The National Church and Social Action Survey in 2014 indicate that 1.1 - 1.4 million volunteers participated in church-based social action in the UK in 2014, touching millions of people through various initiatives such as community building (e.g. parents and toddlers); compassion ministries (e.g. caring for the elderly); crisis intervention (e.g. debt advice); and education (e.g. school assemblies).

Churches in the United Kingdom have increased the average number of volunteer hours on social action to 114.8m per annum. This is an increase of 16.8% compared with two years earlier and 59.4% compared with four years ago.

The top 10 social based activities of churches in the 2014 sample are:

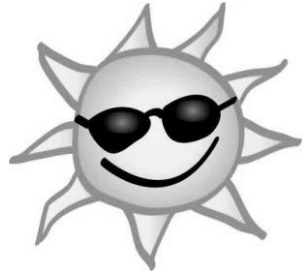
1. Food distribution
2. Parents and toddlers groups
3. Schools assemblies/RE work
4. Festivals/fun days
5. Children's clubs – up to age 11
6. Caring for elderly
7. Debt counselling
8. Youth work – 12-18
9. Cafe open to public
10. Marriage counselling/courses

NEWS FROM THE PORCH BOX PROJECT



Porch Boxes has been helping needy families in Bury and the surrounding regions since 2001. At the AGM last month it was reported that there had been a significant increase in usage during 2014. 4,733 parcels were distributed last year – the highest total in the charity's history. Of the people helped in 2014, 35% stated that they required help due to benefit sanctions, suspensions or disallowances. Another 20% required assistance due to delays in receiving benefits.

The food parcels include enough food for two days and some basic toiletries. (Porch Boxes also provide different types of boxes depending on need including: baby packs, family 7 day boxes, Christmas boxes, street packs for people living rough and home starter packs for people moving on from hostels).

Staff from local agencies (e.g. Social Services, health centres, Children's Centres, etc.) contact Porch Boxes if they come across a person or family in need and someone from the project delivers a parcel to the agency who then pass it on to the person. Referrals also come from other charities, schools or people supporting people in crisis.

Porch Boxes relies on donations of food and toiletries, and a number of groups, churches and primary schools support the work with donations throughout the year. The food donated in churches and schools for instance - at Harvest time - is collected, sorted and stored ready for use throughout the year.
